

Year 6 visit Oxford - Throw away the key!

What a great day! Last week, the children took a trip to Oxford to visit the Natural History Museum and Oxford Castle and Prison.



At the Natural History Museum, the children took part in an Evolve, Adapt and Survive workshop with resident expert, Guy. After exploring how Alfred Russel Wallace and Charles Darwin came up with their solution to the problem of how evolution occurs, the children looked at driving forces of natural selection and fossil history of the evolution of vertebrate life on land. Using a range of specimens from bearded dragons to polar bear feet, the children heard all about how all terrestrial vertebrates evolved from fishy, four-finned ancestor that crawled onto land some 375 million years ago. Guy was so impressed with how the children questioned and challenged him. His passion for history and science really enthused and inspired Year 6.





After a quick exploration of the museum exhibits, year 6 walked across the city to the castle and prison. As part of our Crime and Punishment unit, we were treated to a costumed guided tour of the castle and prison. We climbed the 101 steps to the top of St. George's Tower, then descended underground into the atmospheric Norman crypt, explored their prison cells and discovered the great stories of our most famous inmates.















It was a fabulous day for all the children and staff. Thank you to all those who helped make this day so special.

KS1 reading books

Following a few queries about our reading scheme, I wanted to share a couple of reminders about our phonics and early reading scheme and how you can best support your child at home.

Firstly, a quick reminder that the reading books we send home are intended to be read **3 times** in total: once for decoding, once for fluency and once for comprehension. Phonics should not be the main focus of every read, as by the third read we want children to be decoding easily so that they are able to build confidence with these other skills. If your child reads with an adult in school this could account for one of their reads.

You may have noticed that your child is already quite confident with the letters and phonic sounds in their reading book. This is because the books we send home are intended for children to practise their reading, rather than to learn new sounds. In line with the DfE Reading Framework, our scheme requires that sounds are taught in phonics lessons before being read in books at home. This ensures that our children feel successful with reading from the very beginning and that they feel a sense of achievement when they read. For this reason, your child's teacher will only give them the next level of reading book once the relevant sounds have been taught.

As ever, thank you for all your support with reading at home. It truly makes such a difference for our children. If you have further questions around our phonics scheme or how you can help at home, please refer to the video on the phonics page of our website.


